Time To Rake The Leaves!

Happy Fall! I hope you all are enjoying the cooler weather. Unfortunately, with the weather change, leaves have begun to fall and accumulate where our horses can get to them. While Mulberry leaves can be a tasty treat (as long as they are eaten in moderation), others can be quite toxic. Red Maple leaves, for example, can cause hemolysis of red blood cells. Black Walnut leaves (and most other parts of the tree) cause laminitis and swelling of the lower limbs. Oak leaves and acorns have tannins that can cause damage to the gut, kidneys, and liver if eaten in large quantities. The leaves of Prunus species trees (almonds, peaches, apricots, etc.) can cause cyanide toxicity which prevents the body from using oxygen properly. This is by no means a complete list. If you have any questions about a particular tree or plant, you can find information by consulting the ASPCA Toxic and Non-Toxic Plants List <https://www.aspc.org/pet-care/animal-poison-control/toxic-and-non-toxic-plants/s> or asking your veterinarian.

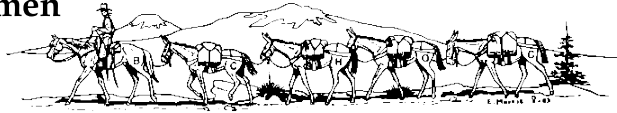

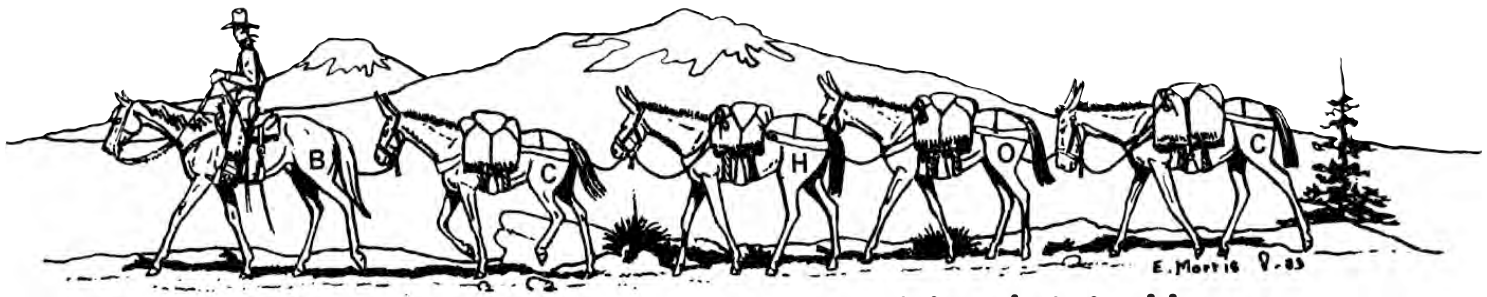
