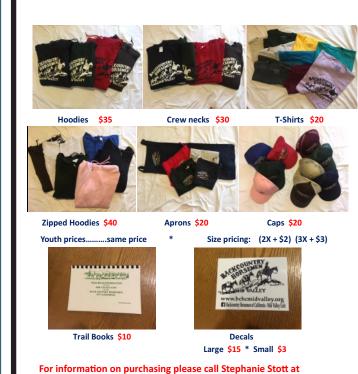

Education

Here are some interesting facts about the Red Hills Recreation Area, where we have our New Year's ride. Some fun trivia.

In 1937, Paramount filmed, in the Red Hills area, the motion picture "North of the Rio Grande". This movie starred William Boyd as Hopalong Cassidy. The studio sent Hetch Hetchy locomotive #30 to roll through the Red Hills scenic landscape.

Parts of "Back to the Future", "Little House on the Prairie", and "Unforgiven" have also been filmed at Red Hills. Placer gold was found in the Six Bit Gulch and the Poor Man's Gulch, two locations in the Red Hills. The gold was mined by the sluice box and hydraulic mining methods during the 1930's and 1940's.

In the 1850's during the California gold rush, Chinese laborers were brought in to mine the areas. The Six Bit and the Poor Man's Gulch produced about \$100,000 worth of gold.

The Red Hills area is about 7100 acres of public land and is home to the bald eagle, western kingbird, and roadrunners to name a few. Mule deer, jackrabbits, coyote, fox, and bobcats can also be found. Next time we can maybe talk about the Tong Chinese war that happened at Red Hills.



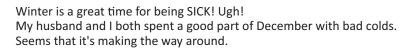

Dutch Oven Cooks Wanted for Polar Plunge Event

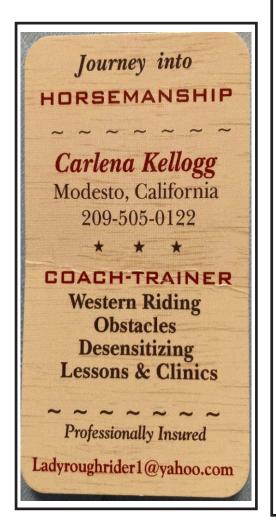

We are having our unit Valentine's Day ride on February 15, at Camanche South Shore in the Turkey Hill area. There is a small fee involved so be prepared for that as you approach the entrance gate. You can buy a day pass, annual pass or a multi-year pass online or at the gate. We will start riding out at 9:30 a. m. for a 2 to 3 hour ride. Lunch will be served by the Mid Valley Unit at 12:30 p.m. After lunch there will be fun and games, so be sure to bring your Valentine even if they don't ride.

East Bay Municipal Utility District (EBMUD) Trail Permits are required because Camanche Recreational Area is owned by a public utility. The trail ride leaders will have permits to cover for the group. We recommend purchasing a trail permit to help show that equestrians are riding and supporting trail use. Vitamin E & Selenium

What do vitamin E and Selenium have in common? They are both powerful – and crucial – antioxidants that work together to maintain appropriate levels of oxidation in the body. But how do these work and what can we do to ensure they are kept at optimal levels in our horses?

Vitamin E is a natural antioxidant that works to maintain normal neuromuscular function. Selenium is a mineral that is used in the body for many functions, including wound healing, fetal development, maintaining a healthy coat, and muscle function. Vitamin E is typically abundant in lush, green pastures but the quantity quickly diminishes with maturation and during harvesting of hay. Likewise, Selenium is typically found in the soil – but in some areas the soil is known to be deficient, such as parts of the California or Southwestern Ontario, Canada. As you can imagine, depending on how our horses are fed and managed, they may be at risk of deficiency of one or both crucial nutrients. While in the short term, a Selenium-deficient horse may be able to manage if they have ample vitamin E (or vice versa), optimal function is only obtained when they have sufficient values of both. Horses managed on dry lots and hayonly diets are often at an increased risk of vitamin E and Selenium deficiency.

Deficiencies in either of these nutrients can present with several different clinical signs. These may include poor hair coat, impaired immune system, poor muscle development and weakness, and in severe or chronic cases, neuromuscular disease or cardiac dysfunction. It is important to note that in some cases, the deficiency may be subclinical – meaning that there are no outward clinical signs, but physiological function may not be ideal.

While it may seem inviting to go ahead and supplement our horses' diets with vitamin E and Selenium, it is important that the correct amount of the nutrient is provided. Both Vitamin E and Selenium may be harmful in excess. Selenium toxicity may present as hair loss, distorted and cracking hooves, and severe toxicities may even be fatal. Vitamin E toxicity is less common but may present as blood clotting or bone mineralization issues. It had also been found that very high vitamin E supplementation (10x the recommended values), negatively affected the absorption of other nutrients.

To evaluate if a horse has a vitamin E or Selenium deficiency, we can send off blood samples to the laboratory for analysis. Depending on the results, a supplementation plan is made, and bloodwork rechecked as needed. There are many different options for supplements for both vitamin E and Selenium. Many feeds are already enriched with a synthetic form of vitamin E, but when we are working to correct a deficiency or treat disease, we reach for a natural form of Vitamin E. These natural forms have been proven to raise the levels of vitamin E in the blood more rapidly and more effectively than their synthetic counterparts.

Monitoring vitamin E and Selenium in our horses can be a key part of improving their health. As with all things nutrition, it is important we consider the *whole horse* – including their current diet, disease status, genetics, and geography!



The Mid Valley BCHC Spring Campout date has been set. We are returning to the Dick Gaiser and Family Historic Cattle Ranch. The weekend will be the following week after Easter. April 25, 26, and 27 are the days of the event. You may pull your rigs in after 12 noon on Friday, April 25 and must leave on Sunday, April 27 in the afternoon. Tents and camp trailers are welcome. You can ride or just come and enjoy the company of Backcountry Horsemen. There is plenty of space and easy access to the camping area.

To participate all weekend, you must be a member of BCH. The event is open to anyone on Saturday for a \$15 fee. If you will be staying for dinner, we encourage you to participate in the potluck event. The fee for members all weekend is \$25. The weekend fee includes breakfast on Saturday morning, packing demo, riding on the ranch, lunch on your own, and an ice cream social after lunch. 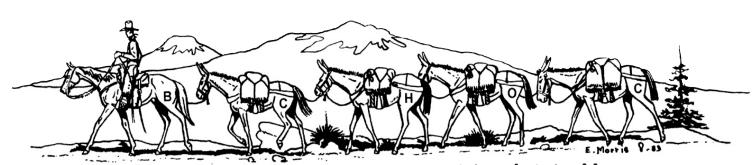
