





Historic Chief Joseph Trail Ride

HISTORIC RIDE OF A LIFETIME!

GENERAL INFORMATION

The Chief Joseph Trail Ride is one of the longest-running historic rides in the United States, hosted by the Appaloosa Horse Club since 1965. It retraces the route taken by Chief Joseph and his people as they fled capture by the US Cavalry during the Conflict of 1877. A progressive ride, it covers an average of one hundred miles each year, with the next year's

ride beginning close to where the previous one concluded. This process continues annually, requiring a total of thirteen years to complete the entire journey from Joseph, Oregon to the Bear Paw battlefield in Montana.

The Chief Joseph is more than a trail ride, for while it provides access to scenic and mountainous riding adventures, it is also accompanied by historical presentations, cultural experiences and social gatherings. The Chief Joseph brings out the best in its participants, teaches them true grit and touches their hearts.

Regardless of ride location any given year, participants are promised an approximate 100-mile ride over a period of five days. A steady 3 to 3 ½ mile-per-hour pace is set to accommodate all levels of horsemanship and riders should be prepared to be astride from as little as eleven and up to thirty miles in a day. The support provided on the trail is second to none. In addition to a scouting team well-versed in back-country riding, the Club also supplies a physician, a nurse, a veterinarian, and a farrier. Satellite phones maintain a life-line with the camp and nearby hospitals so emergency services can be obtained for horse or human, if needed.

After a long day of riding, participants need not worry about preparing meals. The Chief Joseph is fully catered. The club also makes a great effort to provide evening entertainment at dinnertime. History experts are invited to give presentations on the Nez Perce war, offer colorful stories of local families in the region, and communicate their own personal tales as they relate to the Conflict of 1877. In addition to the evening speakers and activities, a portable, raised plywood stage is available and heavily-used for dancing to music supplied by a DJ/musician.

Whether you are looking for an epic trail ride, a cultural experience or a new friendship, the Chief Joseph Trail Ride won't disappoint.





MID VALLEY UNIT BCH SPONSORS RESERVE WORLD CHAMPION INTERSCHOLASTIC PACK TEAM AT BISHOP MULE DAYS

This story begins with Ashley Dollarhide reaching out on Facebook to any students interested in packing mules at Bishop Mule Days. There were nine responses with only four finishing the task. The last of the Mohicans were Alana Black, Hunter Blacksmith, Ann Sleight and Jesse Freitas. All four of these kids have never packed a mule in their life. We only had eight practices before the big event. They progressed quickly at learning how to tie the box hitch knot.

Our first event was the comedy load. We decided to be lumber jacks. Throwing axes at a target placed on the back of Hunter's shirt was a monster hit with the Bishop Clown. He went wild throwing the axe and hitting Hunter. We placed third out of nine teams.

The next day was the annual Bishop parade. We packed up our trusty mule, Magic, with branded MJC logs and a 7-foot whipsaw bowed over the boxes. We had two axes on both sides tied on with our extra long lash rope. When the judging results came in we were third out of nine teams again.

The first competition was a pack and load of different items. I'm sure the butterflies were in their bellies. When the buzzer sounded, they charged at the mules. Things weren't going as smooth as practice. Matter of fact, things were going south. The horse got away and ran into the middle of the arena. Alana ran out and got him and rode him back to the mules. The team kept packing the mules on the move and doing their job. When she returned to the camp, she decided to get off the horse. Much to her surprise he got away again. Alana ran up to him and jumped on the horse again. By that time the team had the load secured tightly. They handed the lead rope to her, and she galloped to the finish line. With all the turmoil in that event, we placed fourth. We felt blessed with that placing.

Our next event was the pack scramble. We got the students all set up at the staging area and then Doug and I went to the end of the arena to film. MJC was to be on the left end of the arena which means they were to come in the arena first. The gate opened and our team did not come in. We were wondering what happened. They finally walked in last with no horse. We didn't see that they switched horses. Alana had a new horse that was a giant. The buzzer went off and they were running to the end to get the animals. They were all packing in sync. Alana had to deal with adjusting the saddle latigo and heaving the saddle over the top. The horse's head was the size of an elephant. Jesse had to come over and adjust the bridal size as Alana could not even reach his head. Jesse then boosted her up and they were off. The good Lord was watching over us as we placed third.

We were sitting in a strong third place for the finals. The top two teams were tied for first. We anticipated that both top teams were going to try for the win. Sometimes that is a curse because their speed is their

enemy. I told our students that slow is fast. Do it right and blow for home. That's exactly what happened. They were in exhilaration when they heard that were crowned Reserve World Champions of the 2025 Bishop Mule Days. They are Rookies no more. Congratulations from all your coaches: Garrett Dollarhide, Kaitlyn Rumsey, Dave Rumsey, Doug and Cathy Dollarhide, Carl Perry and especially to Ashley Dollarhide for making this happen.

The Mighty Mule Legacy



Mule Day in Columbia, Tennessee, is so beloved that it is actually celebrated for four days: in 2025, from April 3–6. Why celebrate such an animal? As the offspring of a male donkey and a female horse, mules are more patient, surer-

footed, and longer-living than horses, and faster, smarter, and more cooperative than donkeys. Mules, it seems, are the best of both worlds.

Mule Day began as Breeders' Day in the 1840s. Farmers would gather from miles around to bring their mules to market on the first Monday in April. This was a crucial business before the advent of mechanical tractors, and Columbia became known as the "Mule Capital of the World." Of course, once tractors came into fashion, the demand for mules slipped, but Columbia continued to hold its traditional Mule Day just the same. Today, Mule Day features mule-driving contests, mule parades, a flea market, music, and food and drink. No other town loves its mules as much as Columbia, Tennessee.

However, Matanzas, Cuba, comes pretty close. This Cuban city celebrates April 27 as Matanzas Mule Day. On this date in 1898, Matanzas became the site of the first military action of the Spanish-American War. American naval ships amassed in the bay and bombarded the city with heavy artillery. Amazingly, the only casualty was a mule, who became an instant folk hero. Legend has it that the Matanzas Mule was buried with full military honors as a military band played for hundreds of mourners. Some claimed this story was a complete fabrication—an act of propaganda meant to humiliate the American forces—but the tradition continues. We may never know for sure which town adores mules more: Columbia, Tennessee, or Matanzas, Cuba. It may make more sense to simply declare April International Mule Month.

We welcome any Dutch oven cooks willing to make one of their delicious desserts that everyone raves about! Social Hour and Silent Auction starts at 6 p.m.,





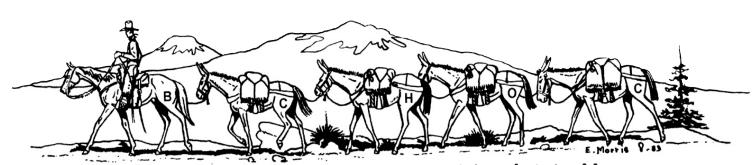
